Give Pope Francis 23/06/2019

"Jesus who after reciting the blessing, gave the loaves to be distributed among the crowd. This tells us something very beautiful. Bread is not only something to be consumed; it is a means of sharing. Surprisingly, the account of the multiplication of the loaves does not mention the multiplication itself. On the contrary, the words that stand out are: "break", "give" and "distribute" (cf. Lk 9:16). In effect, the emphasis is not on the multiplication but the act of sharing. This is important. Jesus does not perform a magic trick; he does not change five loaves into five thousand and then to announce: "There! Distribute them!" No. Jesus first prays, then blesses the five loaves and begins to break them, trusting in the Father. And those five loaves never run out. This is no magic trick; it is an act of trust in God and his providence. "

- ◆ Finance is invested so that the interest can be used. Unfortunately, the return on this investment has declined seriously over the past number of years and looks likely to remain low for the foreseeable future.
- ◆ Parishes give 7.5% of the door collection.
- ◆ Working priests give an annual contribution.
- Special Collection throughout the Diocese on a Sunday in the year.

Poor Servants of The Mother Of God

The Congregation of the Poor Servants of the Mother of God (P.S.M.G.) began in London in 1869 by Frances Margaret (later Mother Magdalen) Taylor, (1832-1900), the youngest child of Henry Taylor, an Anglican clergyman, and his wife, Louisa. At the outbreak of the Crimean War in 1854, Frances volunteered to nurse in the military hospitals in the Crimea. Various influences and experiences there – notably the heroism of the Sisters of Mercy and the faith of the Irish Catholic soldiers – led to her conversion to Roman Catholicism. On the 12th of February in 1872 the Poor Servants of the Mother of God was officially recognised. On the 21st of June 1875, on the Feast of St. Aloysius, Mother Magdalen and two of her Sisters established a community in Carrigtwohill. From Frances's great devotion to the Incarnation flowed her love of the poor, and this in turn led her to found the P.S.M.G.
